Parks give new life to plastic bottles

Recycling your plastic milk, water, juice and soda bottles will help the Park District build beautiful, low-maintenance playground structures.

The following article is reprinted courtesy of *Lake and Prairie*, a publication of the Great Lakes Chapter of the Sierra Club. We were going to write our own article on the recycling program, but found the Chicago Group Chair, Carl Holmgren, the author of the following, said it all very well.

Plastics on Parks (better known as POP), an innovative and energetic program initiated by the Chicago Park District, needs and deserves your support. Plastic, though only about 8% by weight, constitutes approximately 30% by volume of our solid waste stream; it has the added drawback of being nonbiodegradable, meaning that much of our garbage will probably outlive us by several generations.

The Park District's program begins with the collection of green, clear, or white-frosted plastic milk, water, juice, and soda bottles. They will be accepted at all fieldhouses in the Chicago park system during normal operating hours. (Please remember to rinse them out first, for obvious health reasons.)

The plastics will then be shipped in 750-pound bales to Hammer Plastic Recycling Corporation in Iowa, a private recycling company. The firm, which last year received a service award from Sierra Club's Iowa Chapter for its clean remanufacturing process, hopes to expand its operations into the Chicago area.

Hammer will turn the plastic into landscape timbers, which will be used in Chicago to replace wood timbers in the ongoing rehabilitation of more than 500 park playlot structures. The plastic timbers can be cut and nailed or bolted in the same manner as wood, but do not splinter, deteriorate or require paint, stain, or preservatives.

The program has a trifold effect: It diverts high-density, long-lived plastics from overcrowded landfills, provides a low-maintenance product for the park system, and demonstrates to Chicago residents the value of recycling. Public support of such emerging reuse and recycling alternatives is crucial. Instead of pitching out your plastic bottles, pitch in to the Park District's POP program!

All Chicago Park District Offices are accepting plastic containers for recycling. For our area, go to Bernard Shell Park, 3505 North Southport Ave. Hours: 8 A.M.—10 P.M., Mon.—Fri.; 9 A.M.—5 P.M., Sat. & Sun.
