

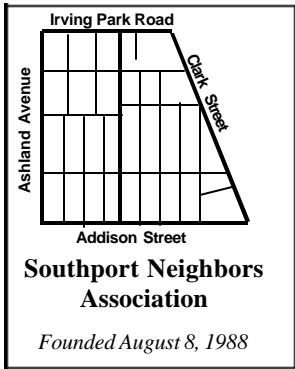

Building off last year's successful, sold-out children's concert at the Mercury Theater, this year's event is moving outdoors to accommodate more performers, activities, food and FUN! The "Southport Children's Festival" will take place on June 8<sup>th</sup> from 10 am – 2 pm in the Blaine School parking lot on Southport (at the corner of Grace Street). ## Notes From Our March Community Meeting TRAC Works to Educate Residents

SNA's March meeting was different than most. Prior to the meeting, Strega Nona played host to residents, providing complimentary wine and appetizers. It gave people a chance to socialize, see old friends and meet new ones. THANK YOU Strega Nona! You are a shining example of what it means to be a good neighbor!

When the meeting moved to the Mercury Theater (also great neighbors!), first on the agenda was our local CAPS meeting, where police discussed crime statistics for the neighborhood and gave tips on how to prevent common crimes. They also answered questions from the crowd regarding specific crimes that have occurred in the recent past.

Next on the agenda was a presentation from TRAC representatives Barb Head and Kathy Krumsee. With the election primary very close, they updated us on where various candidates stand on the important issue of property tax reform. An organization that was born out of an SNA neighborhood meeting, TRAC (Tax Reform Action Coalition) is working hard to ensure that candidates are taking this issue seriously and addressing it in their campaigns. Many people are being forced out of our neighborhood by property taxes-the young and not-so-young, renters and owners alike. If you want to support TRAC's efforts, let us know and we'll put you in touch. And as our presenters stated at the meeting, if you go to any Illinois candidate speech or forum, ask a question about property tax reform. Let's see who is really on our side before the general election.

The meeting closed with a neighborhood forum, where Sean Buino of Alhambra announced a fundraiser to be held at his store on Southport on May 4, to help landscape Juniper Park. Also, questions were asked and answered about the status of the Cubs expansion plans (still unresolved!) The meeting was adjourned at around 9pm.

## **SNA Planning & Development's** *Did you know?*

Mayor Daley introduced new energy efficiency standards intended to lower utility costs and improve the quality of life for Chicago residents. The Chicago Energy Conservation Code, which establishes minimum regulations for the design of energy-efficient buildings, applies to new construction AND building renovations with a change of occupancy -- such as the conversion of industrial space into residential units.

Using the International Energy Conservation Code as a model, the Chicago Energy Conservation Code (CECC) was developed by a committee of local professionals in the building, design and construction industries. Committee members volunteered their services to the Department of Buildings and the Department of Environment.

CECC requirements improve energy efficiency through the insulation of floors, roofs and walls as well as the installation of energy efficient windows and mechanical systems. To reduce the urban heat island effect, the Code implements standards requiring reflective roofs to limit the amount of solar energy absorbed by building roofs and transmitted to the environment. In addition, reducing energy use will reduce pollution from power plants and greenhouse gas emissions, and the annual production of carbon dioxide could be reduced by 20,000 to 30,000 tons simply by using more energy efficient practices.

The Code became effective in December 2001. However, implementation of the permit certification program by Registered Energy Professionals was postponed to allow a greater number of professionals to become acquainted with the Code, receive training and registration and to incorporate these requirements into their designs.

Beginning June 3, 2002, building permit applications will be required to include a statement of compliance from an architect or engineer who has attended one or more workshops and who is listed with the Department of Buildings as a Registered Energy Professional. Permit applications not accompanied by a statement of compliance will be reviewed at the applicant's expense by a third party consultant selected by the Department of Buildings.

The Chicago Energy Conservation Code is endorsed by the U.S. Department of Energy and the State of Illinois Department of Commerce and Community Affairs.

## **Plans in Place to Beautify Juniper Park!**

Juniper Park is being enjoyed by more and more children, due in part to the recent renovation of the play equipment and surfacing. SNA, along with many individuals that live in the neighborhood, would like to enhance the beauty of the park, while maintaining the current play space. Currently, there are planting beds around the perimeter of the park, but not much is growing there.

A committee has been formed to work on landscaping the park, and they are working hard to finalize plans in order to plant in May. The landscaper on this project is using a "double planting" scheme which will intersperse evergreens among deciduous plants so there is winter and summer interest. For summer, the plan is to have ornamental pear trees, hydrangea, lilac, and viburnum. For winter, the plan includes holly bushes, yews and grasses. All of the plantings go into existing beds, so they will not infringe on play space, and most of the current plants will be used. The plan uses only very hearty plants, because of the children and the lack of regular watering during the summer. (The landscaper will be watering generously for the first 4 weeks.)

On May 4, a fundraising event will be held to help fund our beautification efforts. Alhambra Garden, Home & Patio on Southport will be hosting a cocktail party with a silent auction. For a \$25 donation, guests will be treated to appetizers and wine. Items to be auctioned include a one week stay at a cottage in Ireland, a Chicago Bears Brian Erlacher jersey, 2 Blackhawks pucks (signed!), 2 Cubs balls, 2 sets of Cub tickets and concert tickets provided by radio station 101.9.

There is also a raffle, which will be held on Monday, May 13 at Alhambra. We will be giving away a Burmese teak garden bench valued at \$1000. Stop by Alhambra to check it out and buy a raffle ticket or two!

We would like to thank the local vendors who were so generous and supportive in donating the refreshments and raffle items for our fundraiser. We couldn't have done it without these good neighbors! (See page 4 for a complete list.) A special "thank you" goes out to Alderman Hansen, State Representative John Fritchey, and the Chicago Park District for their support and guidance.



# Restaurant Review

Magnolia Café, 1224 W. Wilson

We heard many raves about the Magnolia Café, so when we needed a new spot to entertain friends, we thought we'd give it a try. The Café is charming, with a quiet, romantic décor. The night we were there was not crowded but a steady flow of diners came and went.

The food is exceptionally good. I had Wild Mushroom and Bleu Cheese Ravioli in a brown butter vinaigrette. It was very tasty and the bleu cheese was not overbearing. My partner had the seafood special: Halibut. I am not always fond of halibut, but I will order it the next time I go—it was that good. Our friend had the meat special: Beef Tenderloin which was "to die for"; cooked to perfection. It melted in my mouth.

Two of us started the meal with the Slow Roasted Tomato and Arugula Salad and I would go back just for that! The dessert menu had about six choices; we ended up with a fancy banana split. The three of us couldn't finish it and we are not shy eaters!

I recommend the Magnolia Café for a quiet evening and great food. I warn you, however, that it is quite pricey. In another neighborhood it would be expensive; at Wilson and Magnolia it is close to being outrageous.
